Drought Conditions Improve

As of August 21, 2025, thanks to recent rainfall and cooler temperatures, the province has dropped the Okanagan to **Drought Level 0** for this week.

This improvement in conditions is encouraging but summer is not yet over. The risk of high heat remains, and elevated river temperatures continue to pose a serious threat to fish populations, despite normal precipitation values earlier this month.

Despite improving conditions in the Okanagan, neighbouring regions like the Nicola and Similkameen Valleys remain at **Drought Level 3** and **4**, respectively.

Forecasts for next week show very little to no precipitation and increased temperatures, which will likely worsen conditions once again. It is, therefore, crucial that we all continue to practice water conservation. We're entering a pivotal time for both farmers and fish migration, and water is the most important piece for their success.

Preserving water makes a big difference and also allows local governments, provincial staff, local First Nations and others to continue to work together to improve and monitor conditions valley wide.

As always, **your local watering restrictions** are the most important indicator of how your local watershed is performing. Following these restrictions is the most important thing you can do for yourself and your neighbours.

Don't get caught off guard! We've provided the current conditions of several local communities in the Okanagan below.




